The Schachne Family Offers Helping Hands

It was Andrea and Jay Schachne's personal experiences with hospice that led them to underwrite Helping Hands at Home, a new program at HopeHealth. Andrea has been a hospice volunteer at HopeHealth for more than a decade, and Jay, a cardiologist, has counseled many patients and their families.

When their own parents needed care, they naturally turned to hospice – Jay's father with a hospice in Long Island, NY, and Andrea's mother with HopeHealth.

Like many patients, their parents needed around-the-clock care. Fortunately, the Schachnes could afford private help. Those helping hands supported their parents' dignity and allowed them to spend time together as a family. The Schachnes decided that other families should have access to this help too, whether or not they had means.

They turned to organizations they knew well to create the program: first the agency in Long Island, then the hospital system where Jay was practicing. Then, said Jay, "after Andrea's mother's incredible experience with HopeHealth, we wanted to bring this program to our home state of Rhode Island."

With a generous gift of \$100,000 through the Dorothy and David Schachne Charitable Foundation, they helped launch HopeHealth's Helping Hands at Home.

Since the program launched at HopeHealth in April 2021, more than 20 patients have taken advantage of this new opportunity.

"Many people wish to spend their final days at home," said Suzanne Fortier, Chief Philanthropy Officer. "We are so grateful to the Schachne family for this incredible gift."

Andrea added: "Everyone deserves it. It means so much to our family that Helping Hands at Home is available in Rhode Island."

The construction project offered an opportunity to perform an overall refresh to a facility that has cared for more than 16,000 patients and their families in the last 12 years.

The expanded Hulitar Hospice Center maintains the original building's design and philosophy, providing a calming atmosphere the moment patients and their families come through the doors.

"At end of life, each hour is precious. Expanding to 30 rooms ensures that everyone who needs specialized hospice care can get it immediately," noted Franchitto.

Mark Tracy Dedicates his Iron Man Race to Camp BraveHeart

This November, HopeHealth Board Member Mark Tracy will compete in the Ironman Florida in Panama City Beach. Tracy's goal is to complete the grueling triathlon—a 2.4 mile swim, 112-mile bike ride and 26.2-mile run—and to raise \$10,000 or more in support of Camp BraveHeart, Hope-Health's summer program for kids ages 4 to 17 who have lost a loved one.

Tracy's motivation is personal. His father died when he was nine and he lost his mother as a 19-year-old Brown University freshman. "I felt so alone when I lost my parents. It's great that these kids have a place where they can process their grief, surrounded by those who share the experience," he said.

For Tracy, the Ironman is a metaphor for life and the challenges we face along the journey towards the cheering crowd. "I think that's what Camp BraveHeart gives these kids – the ability to take on the challenge of loss and have the support they need to keep going."

More than 800 inscribed bricks fill the Memorial Garden at the Hulitar Hospice Center. A peaceful oasis in the city, the garden's trees, flowering shrubs and brick pathway pay tribute to family and friends who have died. Many families find comfort in visiting the garden, as a special place to remember their loved ones.

So much love can be expressed in just 39 letters on a brick paver. While most families have only one or two bricks in memory of loved ones, Warwick resident Bob Christina has purchased more than 50 bricks in memory of his parents, James and Josephine Christina, and many other loved ones over the last 12 years. A musician, Christina hosts an annual fundraiser in Westerly, "MitchFest," named for his father, James "Mitch" Christina. For the Christina family, the events—and the bricks—are a way to give back for the care their family members have received and support other hospice families through their generosity.
